

Did You Know?

- 95% of inmates will return to society and, without help, over 60% will return to prison.
- Women inmates are being incarcerated at twice the number of men.
- Prisons, welfare case loads and courtrooms are overloaded.
- Children of incarcerated parents are more likely to develop criminal behavior and become incarcerated, maintaining a pattern of criminal behavior.
- Available community resources are difficult to identify with few solely directed toward women.
- The current cost is approximately \$35,000 to \$45,000 per year to house a single inmate.

HOPE After Care
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God's Heart for Prisoners

There is a soft spot in God's heart for those who are incarcerated and in bondage. He has charged us to not forget them.

Currently, women are being incarcerated at a rate of 2 to 1 over men and it doesn't look like that is going to change any time soon. Often, when a woman is "locked up," her children are equally incarcerated.

Who is caring for them?

Of those in prison today, 95% will be released back into society. Will they be in a position to succeed or fail upon re-entry?

We believe it is necessary to network with individuals, churches and service agencies in the community so we can surround the individual with the necessary physical, emotional and spiritual support they need to succeed.

This Community of Support will identify the individual's needs and then work together to meet those needs in a loving and caring manner. The person should know they are loved by God and should never feel alone or isolated. Such a community would include (but not be limited to) government officials, the medical community, legal assistance, law enforcement, businesses, financial institutions, churches, counselors and those involved in addiction counseling.

We believe this community can help lower the rate of re-offense!

Three Phases of Support

Phase One—Inside

HOPE After Care will work with existing jail and prison ministries to assess program applicants and will determine which women are best suited to benefit from our support. Together, we will determine what are each woman's barriers to successful re-entry into society. These barriers may include housing needs, employment, transportation, child care, etc.

Our staff will meet with each woman before she leaves jail to begin our relationship and discuss re-entry logistics.



Phase Two—Transition

From the moment a woman walks out of jail/prison, she will be met by a member of the transition team. This team will know and be prepared to meet her immediate needs and will guide her through the first few hours of re-entry. That may include taking her to a doctor, getting her driver's license, seeing her family, moving her into a home, etc.

The transition team (3-5 people) will support each woman during her first two months out of prison/jail. They will assist her to get back on her own two feet.

Phase Three—After-Care

After two months, transitional needs should minimize for these women...but they will still need ongoing support through mentors.

This After-Care phase includes:

- Circles of Support
- Job training
- Counseling
- Finding them a loving church family

Circles of Support are regular gatherings where members of the community and former inmates come together to learn and provide support. The meetings focus on positive life changes and often include education about a specific issue such as stress management or nutrition. At the end of each meeting, needs are shared and help is volunteered. These are often practical needs such as moving furniture or providing baby clothes.

Mentor teams of 2-3 people will continue to support each woman for up to ten months—helping her through life's decisions.
